'Radicalisation' is defined as the process by which people come to support/promote extremism or terrorism or and in some cases, to then participate in terrorist activity.

'Extremism' is vocal or active opposition to fundamental British Values including Democracy, Rule of Law, Individual Liberty and Mutual Respect and Tolerance of those with different faiths or beliefs. This also includes calling for the death of our Armed Forces.

Since the publication of the 'Prevent Strategy', there has been an awareness of the specific need to safeguard children, young people and families from violent extremism. There have attempts to radicalise vulnerable children and young people to hold extreme views including views justifying political, religious, sexist or racist violence, or to steer them into a narrow and rigid ideology that is intolerant of diversity and leaves them vulnerable to future radicalisation.

Keeping children safe from these risks is a safeguarding matter and is approached in the same way as safeguarding children and young people from any other risks.

Children and young people should be protected from messages of all violent extremism including but not restricted to eg those linked to extreme Islamist ideology or to Far Right/White Supremacist Ideology, Irish Nationalist and Loyalist Paramilitary groups and extremist Animal Rights groups.

'Prevent' in the context of counter terrorism is intervention before any criminal offence has been committed and is with the intention of preventing individuals or groups from committing crimes

			Where it is felt that children are not adhering to these values, parents will be contacted and a discussion will take place to discuss how school and family can work together to support each other in developing these values.  Any child brought to the attention of staff due to behaviour outside of school whilst wearing the school uniform who do not adhere to school values, parents meetings are arranged to discuss further.	
6	Welfare and Pastoral Support	i) The organization provides effective welfare and pastoral support which results in young people (and staff) being supported and not at risk of vulnerabilities being exploited.  ii) Staff or other contracted providers (regular supply or agency staff) are aware of the organisation's procedure for handling concerns and feel comfortable sharing information internally  iii) Young people are not radicalized by factors internal or external to the school	Pupils are well supported by all staff. The schools have a family support worker and a number of ELSAs to support pupils with issues they may face. Mental Health First Aiders have been trained in school.  SLT and teachers currently have access to CPOMS. Teaching support and office staff use CPOMS to report any concerns raised with regard to radicalisation. Agency staff/visitors into school are provided with cause for concern forms to fill in that are given directly to a DSL who will action as appropriate. This will then be recorded on CPOMs.  All appropriate action is taken by all staff members to ensure that children are not drawn into extremism.  Volunteers, students and supply staff undergo induction prior to beginning work in school. This includes providing them with a copy of "Keeping children safe in Education 2022" and the school safeguarding policy, code of conduct, use of technology. An induction form is then kept on file. The school ID badges worn by all staff and visitors have information on to	

			inform who DSL's are in school and who to contact if a concern is raised.  Visitors are directed to a one page Code of Conduct prior to entering school.

The school sites are secure. There is very little opportunity for pupils to have access to members of the public which would endanger their safety.  Relevant security checks are undertaken on a regular basis.

When charities are allowed on the premises robust checks are carried out on the ultimate destination of the monies.  Staff ensure that visitor badges are collected back in on leaving. Visitor badges do not have fobs on them that give access to opening the electronic doors.  All hazardous materials are kept locked away from pupils and individuals whom are not allowed to use them.		
9	Prayer and Faith Facilities	i) Requirements of young people (or staff) requiring faith support or the use of facilities are not met by the organisation resulting in individuals seeking external support of unknown suitability.  ii) Facilities (either prayer rooms or quiet space type facilities) provided are not effectively managed or supervised and become ungoverned spaces where radicalising, inappropriate or dangerous activities can take place.	No prayer facilities are currently required by any pupils. In the event that these were required, staff would monitor their use.  A few members of staff (including agency staff) have occasionally requested opportunity to pray and space has been provided for them to do this on an individual/private basis. This space would be identified as being a multi-faith space available for any member of staff requiring it. SLT are aware of members of staff who have requested a space to pray.
